# Thanks to You, Linda Reconnected With the Jewish Community

#### And now her daughter Vivi is getting a Jewish education!

Linda Colarusso and her family have lived in East Chula Vista for over 20 years. They weren't affiliated with any synagogues and didn't feel part of any Jewish communities. Their older sons were bar mitzvahed but didn't enjoy the experience. "I felt alone and unsupported," says Linda.

Then Linda received an email from Chabad asking for volunteers, and she decided to help deliver holiday packages. Rabbi Mendy asked if she would want to send her daughter Vivi to Hebrew School. "I was hesitant at first because my husband is not Jewish," says Linda. "I didn't know how the Chabad worked and I wasn't sure that would be OK. I thought we wouldn't be accepted. But Rabbi Mendy was always so welcoming so we decided to go for it."

Vivi joined Hebrew School, and the family became more involved with Chabad. "It was so nice to be a part of a community that I haven't been a part of since I was bat mitzvahed, like 35 years ago," Linda says. "We really feel happy being there, we feel comfortable and accepted. We're more connected to our Judaism now. It's just that feeling of belonging. It's like getting a virtual hug the moment you walk in, because you're just embraced in this positive, warm, loving community feeling.

"It's filling a hole that was there for many, many years."

Now Vivi is learning about her traditions and receiving a joyful Jewish

education. "Honestly, before Hebrew School, I was pretty clueless," says Vivi. "Now I'm in awe of all the things I know.

Now Sierra loves attending Chabad events, including the women's class. "We're learning about mitzvahs, like about kosher food. The classes keep getting better and better."

Sierra says, "Thanks to you, I'm getting a Jewish education that I never received. You touched my life with your kindness."
